SUBJECT: Budget Amendment and Purchase of PG&E Water

OPERATIONS

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve budget amendment BA 2021-174 and authorize staff to purchase PG&E contract water.

BACKGROUND:

Extremely dry and hot conditions led to the adoption of Resolution 2021-11, A Declaration of Drought, at the April 28, 2021 Board of Directors meeting. As part of the declaration, the Board directed staff to pursue a budget amendment for the purchase of PG&E contract water. The intent of the purchase is to bolster carryover storage heading into the 2022 water year.

The importance of finding additional water supplies continues to increase as drought intensifies. Staff has attached updated water supply and storage forecast slides that compare end of season carryover with, and without PG&E water. Based on the analysis, the purchase of supplemental water is necessary to ensure public health and safety supplies in the event that the 2021/2022 winter is dry.

To facilitate the purchase, Operations reached out to multiple departments for monetary assistance and received great support. The table below provides a breakdown of the funding and the projects the funds were pulled from. A more detailed description follows the table.

The Operations Department transfer of \$70,000 is available thanks to the successful challenge and reconsideration of fees for water right renewals. Staff, with the support of legal counsel, successfully argued that the State Water Resources Control Board misclassified NID water right renewals fees and overcharged. The revised billing saved the District \$80,000 in renewal fees. The budget transfer for the purchase of water can occur without any adverse effects to other Operations projects.

The Recreation Department was able to transfer \$200,000 from the General Capitol Budget by withholding the purchase of a generator for the Scotts Flat Campground. The transfer of funds will be offset by a donation of a generator from the water division. This is possible due to the expansion of the David Way Pump Station, which will necessitate a new generator, thereby freeing up the old unit for repurpose at the Scotts Flat Campground.

The Engineering Department transferred \$350,000 from the Alta Sierra Tank Construction Project. The original design build project included a 5 million gallon (MG) reservoir. Per staff recommendation, the Board elected to downsize the tank from 5 MG to 3 MG, thus creating an overall project savings of \$450,000. The transfer of \$350,000 to Water Operations will not adversely affect the final project.

In summary, a combination of the Operations 2021 water purchase budget (\$80,000) and the budget transfers listed above, will allow for the purchase of nearly 16,000 acre feet of water from PG&E. The table below provides the timing and amounts of purchase through the summer. More water is available in October should extra funding present itself.

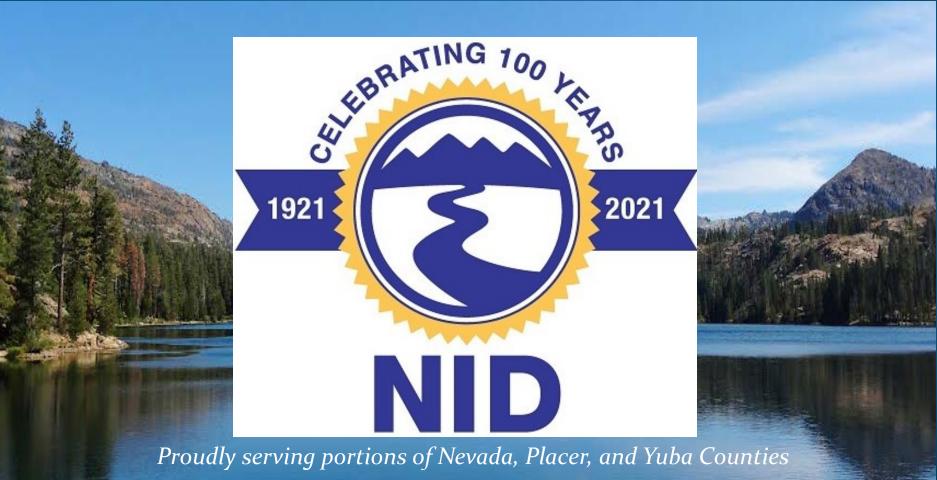

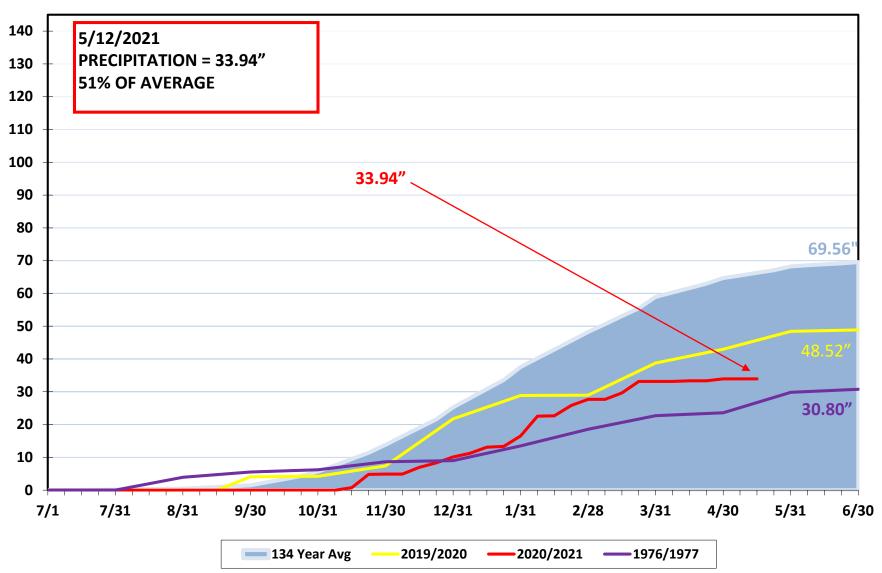

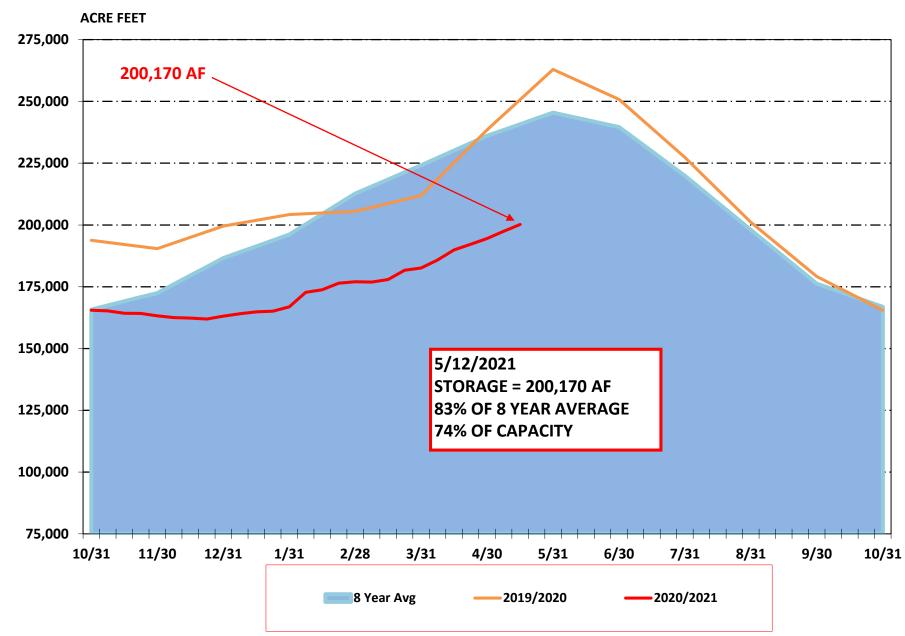


BOWMAN LAKE PRECIPITATION

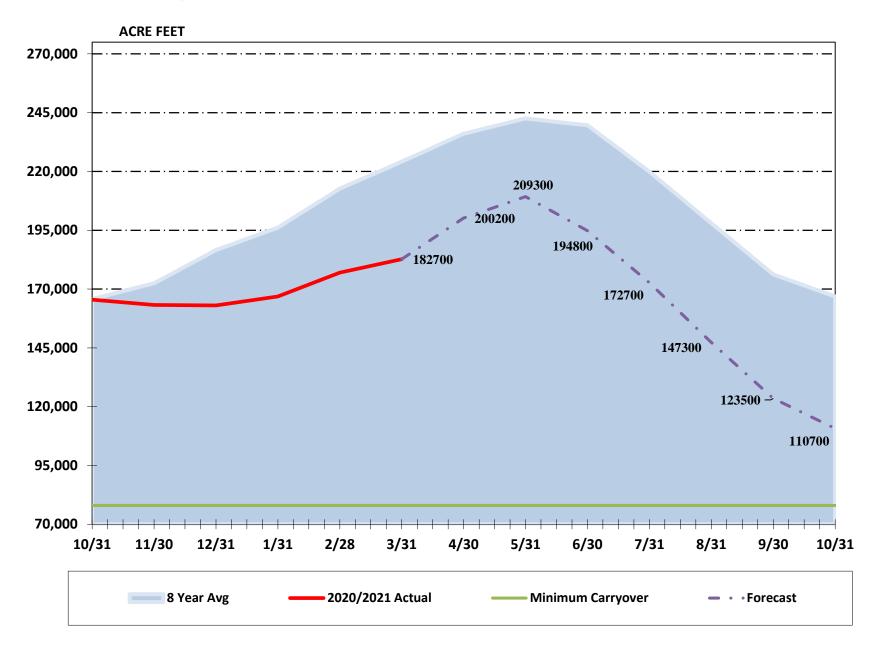

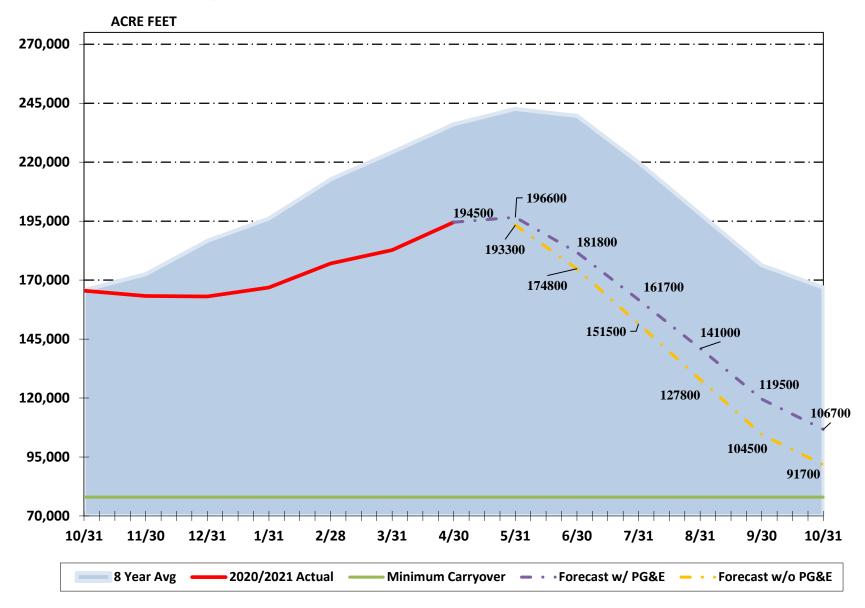
NID RESERVOIR STORAGE
